



Coronavirus (Covid-19) Catch-Up Premium 2020-21

Due to the coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic, students have experienced unprecedented disruption to the education in the academic year 2019-20. In June 2020 the government announced £1 billion of funding to support children and young people to catch up on missed learning caused by the pandemic. This is especially important for the most vulnerable students and students from disadvantaged backgrounds who have been most affected. As part of the £1b funding, a one-off universal £650m catch-up premium for 2020-21 was announced, to ensure that schools have the support they need to help all students make up for the missed learning.

STRATEGY STATEMENT

Since the onset of the pandemic, staff at UHS have remained focused on supporting all of the student body when in school, at home and where a mixed economy has prevailed. Our approach has been a flexible and multifaceted one, employing the widest range of initiatives and support mechanisms.
